Who should you connect with?

In November, the Upward Bound Program at Airport High School held a school-wide clothing drive. The drive was a rousing success—thanks in no small part to the students who planned and organized the school clothing drive and then showed up to help collect, sort, box, and load the many donations collected at the Annual Holiday Clothing Drive at the Carleton Hotel in Carleton, on Saturday, Dec. 1.

We were able to collect almost two full carloads from the high school alone. When combined with the donations collected at the Carleton Hotel, we filled a ten-foot truck and then some! The clothing donations (as well as several boxes filled with toiletry items—always a big need) were delivered to the Oaks of Righteousness in Monroe.

Students who helped were given community service credit for their work. The Upward Bound Program requires students to perform a minimum of ten hours of community service each school year. Why do we do this? Well, in the big picture, giving back to your community promotes personal growth and self-esteem. When people come together to give their time and energy to a worthy cause, they feel better about themselves; they meet new people and learn about their community and its needs and services. Volunteering strengthens the community, supports families and youth, improves schools, and allows worthy causes to save money and resources that would otherwise come from often under-funded budgets.

On a more practical level, students who perform community service gain new knowledge, skills, and valuable work experience. These can be added to job applications and resumes—and for high school students who have not yet entered the work force, may help them stand out and land a job they may not have otherwise been able to get.

Community service work is also an important part of a student's portfolio when applying to colleges and universities—especially schools with lower acceptance rates. Colleges and universities that are selective are flooded with applications from students with great GPAs and SAT scores, and often have to look at intangibles in order to select the best candidates. Strong extracurricular involvement, including community service, can make the difference between being accepted, and not being accepted, by your college of choice. The key to quality community service is to pick something you are passionate about or that you enjoy. This will help motivate you to do the work and will demonstrate that you are capable of committing your time to a project. So, if you have not already, get started today. Find your passion, get out there and work!

#### The following is important information for seniors:

#### Monroe High School Transcripts:

Monroe High School electronically sends official transcripts to the colleges and universities that you choose through Parchment. This is a more efficient and secure process to send your credentials. Additionally, Parchment has "College Tools" available where one can do college searches; receive college recommendations, compare colleges, participate in a college discussion forum, and view college rankings based on actual student information. Simply go to **Parchment.com** to sign up.

#### **Scholarships:**

There are thousands of scholarships available out there from all sorts of institutions and organizations. Scholarships are available through your high school, the colleges/universities one is applying to, locally, nationally, and through businesses and corporations. First, begin your scholarship search at the colleges and/or universities that you plan on attending. For example, MCCC has scholarships you can apply to and only use at MCCC.

The end of the first semester is quickly approaching, and Upward Bound students have been busy completing work and studying for tests and quizzes in our after school program. Our group is much larger this year, and with about 30-40 students attending the after school program each day, the location of tutoring has spread to include the library and other teacher's classrooms as well. Jefferson's UB students have also had the opportunity to attend a field trip each month. We toured Eastern Michigan University's campus in October, learned traditional Latin dances and made our own authentic Mexican lunch at the Sofia Quintero Art and Cultural Center in November, and visited the Toledo Zoo Lights before Christmas in December. We will be taking the month of January off as students prepare for exams, but plan to attend STEM Night and watch a Walleye game at the Huntington Center on February 1st.

As the school year continues, I would like to remind UB students the importance attendance has on their educational success. According to the campaign, Absences Add Up, being absent from school just twice a month can have a significant negative impact on your overall success. The campaign states that students with fewer absences generally "get better grades, develop healthy life habits, avoid dangerous behavior, and have a better chance of graduating from high school." They also say that, "students who attend school regularly also feel more connected to their community, [and] develop important social skills and friendships." Here are a few tips on how to improve attendance in order to make sure you are in school and on time each day:

1. Make School a Priority- Change your evening routine to one that will help you get to school successfully in the morning. Don't procrastinate the completion of your homework, be mindful of the time, and don't stay awake just to check your phone or watch television.

2. Get a Good Night's Rest- Waking up early can be a challenge, but waking up when you've only had a few hours of sleep can be near impossible. The National Sleep Foundation recommends 8-10 hours of sleep each night for teens, so work hard on going to bed at a reasonable hour.

3. Plan Ahead- Pick out what you're going to wear and pack your breakfast and lunch the night before. This will save you valuable time in the morning.

4. Use an Alarm Clock- If you aren't already, using an alarm clock is a great tool to help you wake up in the morning. However, instead of keeping it right next to you, place it across the room so that when it goes off in the morning, you cannot just hit snooze and rollover, but actually have to get out of bed to turn it off.
