

Building Report | SS/A Building | Micro-Market Conversion

The following are pictures from the weeks of 12.23.19 - 1.13.20 in regards to the Micro-Market Conversion located in the Student Services/Administration Building. This is the one and only report that will be issued for this project. With the food service vendor change for the College it was necessary to renovate the old cafeteria serving area in order to provide a new food service to students and staff. In order to accomplish this the area was reconfigured with some existing openings between the kitchen and the serving area being closed, some existing and cooking equipment removed, and some new construction to accommodate new equipment. New finishes and lighting were also installed as part of this project.



In the top-left photo you can see the extent of the renovation of the old cafeteria serving area over to the new micro-market. The area was stripped down to bare studs and floor slab. New walls were constructed as necessary to house coolers, racks, cabinetry, etc. Additionally, the old ceiling and lighting was removed and replaced with new tile and LED lights.



In the top-right photo one can see the progress of the renovation. The new walls are finished as well as the new floor tile has been installed. Here the contractors are also beginning the installation of the new cabinetry that house supplies (along the east wall) and supplies/microwaves (west wall).

In the bottom-left photo you can see some of the contractors installing the new ceramic tile backsplash and slat wall finishes to the east wall of the new micro-market. Additionally, you can see that the new bulkheads are finished and the new ceiling grid is in along with the new energy-efficient LED light fixtures.

The bottom-right photo highlights some of the features of the finished renovated space. All of the coolers (food and beverage) are installed and stocked, the coffee/tea/hot chocolate serving station is up and running. The sweet/salty wall is in place, and the self-checkout kiosks (not pictured) are also operational.
